CORE RULES Chapter 0

0.1.1: Introduction | return to menu

Enduro mountain bike racing is designed to be the definitive test for the mountain biker, with the focus of each event on creating a great atmosphere, community, competition and adventure for the competitor, including the best riding on the best terrain available in the host region.

The racing platform detailed below outlines a format that allows riders to compete against each other, starting individually, on Special Stages which are designed to challenge the rider's technical ability and physical capacity.

This Rulebook outlines the specific competition regulations for the UCI Mountain Bike UCI Enduro World Cup (ENDURO) and its affiliate events. The following rules aim to define the enduro mountain bike discipline while still allowing space for the individual tier levels to add their own individual characteristics to each event.

Warner Brother Discovery Sports (WBDS) reserves the right to change these rules at any time.

0.2.1 Tier 1 - UCI World Cup

GENERAL

As UCI registered events, Tier 1 events will follow the basic UCI General Rules (Part I) and UCI Mountain Bike Rules (Part IV).

Tier 1 events will also follow and expect all riders and teams to follow the UCI Anti-Doping rules. Information on Anti-Doping and International Testing Agency (ITA) can be found on www.ita.sport

- UCI sanctioned
- Prequalified riders only (from Enduro Global Rankings, Official UCI Mountain Bike World Series Teams & UCI MTB Teams and National Federations)
- UCI License ID mandatory

OTHER WORLD SERIES QUALIFIERS [WSQ]

- ❖ At the discretion of WBDS additional races which meet specific criteria may be designated WSQ's
- Open entry no prequalification requirements. Entries available directly through individual event organisers
- Racers with a UCI license and a WHOOP UCI Mountain Bike World Series account created are eligible to collect Enduro Global Ranking points.

0.3: Event Entry | return to menu

0.3.1 Categories

All categories are based on rider age on the 31 December of the competition year.

The official 2025 categories for the Enduro Global Rankings as well as UCI Enduro World Cup standings are as follows:

Women Elite Women Junior (2007 - 2008) Men Elite Men Junior (2007 - 2008)

0.3.2 Transgender Policy

UCI Mountain Bike World Series adopts the current UCI policies and guidelines on transgender athlete eligibility.

0.3.3 Race Licenses

Tier 1 Events

UCI licenses are mandatory for all racers in Tier 1 events.

Tier 2 Events

License requirements for Tier 2 events are established by the National Federation in the host country and vary depending on the event. It is the responsibility of the racer to check and comply with license requirements.

Racers may also have the option to race with a one event license available for purchase from the national cycling federation in the host country, depending on host nation requirements. Check the Race Book or the Event Organiser's website for more details.

Only racers holding a valid / active UCI license ID will be eligible to collect Enduro Global Ranking points.

A rider must hold a valid UCI license ID prior to starting the race in which they hope to win points. No points will be awarded retrospectively should a rider purchase a UCI license after an event.

0.3.4 Qualification

Tier 1 Events



Qualification requirements for Tier 1 events are detailed in Chapter 1.

Tier 2 Events

There are no pre-qualification requirements for Tier 2 events. Entries offered on a space available basis.

0.4: Course | return to menu

0.4.1 Structure

Enduro racing is "The ultimate physical & technical challenge for every athlete on the best trails in the world" and should make best use of the trails and terrain available to the Event Organiser. Additionally, rider experience and enjoyment should be the focus for any course designer. Enduro race courses should therefore be designed with an "all mountain" riding skill set in mind and a bike utilising suspension travel in the range of 140-160mm travel as an "optimum". It is expected that, to achieve the best riding on the best trails possible & to suitably challenge the athletes, some Special Stages will feature a degree of climbing.

Liaison Stages

The composition of each liaison Stage is at the discretion of the Event Organiser. Mechanical uplift (chairlift, shuttle etc), rider power (pedalling) or a combination of both is acceptable.

As a guideline, at least one liaison Stage per event should be fully pedal powered (not chairlift, shuttle etc).

Special Stages

All Special Stages must follow a predominantly descending route and focus on testing the rider's technical skills.

As a guideline Special Stages will contain an absolute maximum of 10% climbing and at least 90% descending. (Example: 2 vertical metres ascent for every 20 vertical metres descent).

All wooden features (eg. wall-rides or large bridges) especially those that are situated in compressions, turns or braking zones should be covered adequately with an anti-slip surface material (ie. Wire mesh & or anti slip paint)

B-Lines must be created at every major gap jump or major drop off.

The General Classification (GC) of each race will be calculated by adding all Special Stage times together.

The start and finish of each Special Stage will be clearly marked on the official course map. Stage Start and Finish locations must be clearly marked ahead of training starting

There is no minimum or maximum duration for a Special Stage.

All Special Stages must be fully marked prior to Official Training and must be closed to the public during all Official Training times.

0.4.2 Directions and Types of Course Marking

Course Markers

Course markers may be used to define the trail in place of, or in conjunction with tape or branding. Course markers installed on opposite sides of the course will create a "gate", riders must pass between them. (see images for an example of course markers)

Gates


Gates can be used to clearly mark sections of the course that a rider must pass through. Missing a gate will be deemed as course cutting. (see images for an example of a Gate)

Tape

Course "Tape" (either single use or reusable) may be used on one or both sides of a course. Course "tape" installed on opposite sides of a course constitutes a "gate" which riders must pass between (See above). In these areas, missing, crossing or passing the course tape on the wrong side will be deemed as course cutting. (See images for an example of course taping.)

Branding

Branding can be used as course marking in certain sections. Branding will be used in conjunction with other course markings to create a gate which riders must pass between.

0.5: Competition Requirements | return to menu

0.5.1 Rider Equipment

Only one frame, fork and one set of wheels can be used by a racer during a race.

Only upon notifying & being given permission by, a member of "Race Control" i.e. the UCI chief Commissaire, or Race Director (LOC & or WBD) can a racer replace a frame, fork or wheel during the race.

A **three-minute penalty** will be awarded to every racer who, having notified the Commissaire or Race Director, replaces the equipment listed above.

Any racer found to have replaced a frame, fork or wheel during the race **without** notifying the Commissaire or Race Director will be disqualified (DSQ).

A racer can use different/unmarked equipment during Official Training.

0.5.2 Equipment Marking

Equipment Marking Stickers must be utilised at all Tier 1 & 2 events.

Stickers must be applied on the rider's right-hand side of the bike.

- Fork Crown
- Swingarm / Rear triangle



- Front triangle
- Both wheel rims

Racers who lose their stickers prior to the race start may be issued a time penalty.

Racers' bikes & marking stickers will be checked by the appointed UCI commissaires at the start of the race before roll out and at the finish of the final stage. Other random checks of stickered equipment may be carried out throughout the race.

Following an officially sanctioned repair, the racer must return to the Commissaire or Race Director to have the replacement part(s) re-marked (if applicable) before rejoining the race.

0.5.3 Race / Number Plates

Number plates will be distributed at each round during rider confirmation. Scheduled confirmation times will be published in advance. If a rider fails to attend to collect their number plate during the scheduled confirmation times they will be removed from the start list.

Number plates must be displayed on the bike for practice and race days. Riders not displaying number plates will not be permitted to start on any stages.

0.5.4 Timing transponders

Timing transponders will be distributed before the commencement of racing & will be attached to the bike. Tier 1 racers will carry two chips mounted one on the right fork leg & one on the seat post. Tier 2 Open racers will carry 1 chip mounted on the right fork leg.

Timing for all other WSQ races will be the responsibility of the event organiser.

0.5.5 Training

On-bike training must be scheduled by the Event Organiser on all Special Stages before timed competition begins. Practice on all Special Stages is strongly recommended *but not mandatory*.

Detailed training schedules will be published during race week & published in the Race Book & distributed by means of rider comms via email, WhatsApp etc. (see Chapter 0.8.1).

In rare circumstances (e.g. remote backcountry/weather), and only when approved by WBD Enduro Sport manager, can scheduled training times be reduced or removed completely.

At all World Cup and Open racing events (Tier 1 & 2), following the official course release, all Special Stages must be kept closed to racers & other bike riders until Official Training commences. This is to allow the organisation to safely mark and prepare each Special Stage. Any racer found riding on a Special Stage outside of Official Training will be subject to a penalty including disqualification.

This restriction is not applicable to Tier 3 Qualifier events unless specifically stated in the individual event rules or Race Book.

At all UCI Enduro World Cup and Open racing events, a maximum of ONE training run is allowed per Special Stage, including any repeated stages.

This restriction is not applicable to Tier Three Qualifier events unless specifically stated in the individual event rules or Race Book however WBDS recommends limiting the training time to reduce the impact of excess rider traffic on trails and to increase the fairness between local and visiting racers.

Unless otherwise agreed by WBDS, Official Training should not take place more than two days prior to the race.

During Official Training times, riders must only access a Special Stage from the Stage start and are NOT permitted to push up within the course or create congestion by stopping on a Special Stage during Official Training. Any rider found to be accessing a stage, or section of a stage, by pushing or riding upwards against the direction of travel will be penalised.

Stopping to assess or 'Sectioning' a particular feature of a Special Stage is allowed unless otherwise stated. Rider's stopping to assess or "section" a specific feature or section of track during practice, must stop in a safe place, which does not impede any other riders on course and then exit the marked course with their bike. If necessary to section a feature a rider may push up outside of the course marking.

Only competing riders with a number plate issued for that specific race attached to their bike will be allowed on course during Official Training. In addition, select riders including Officials, Team staff & media will also be allowed access providing they display the relevant plates (issued by WBD.)

Walking of stages without a bike is allowed at any time after course release unless stated in the event's Race Book. However, it should be noted that "course walking" may be of limited benefit as final course preparation & marking may not be fully complete until official practice begins.

With the exception of those competing in the E-Enduro category of the Open race, competing racers are NOT permitted to use an e-bike on any part of the course during Official Training.

0.5.6 Shuttling

The transport of riders between Special Stages by private/team transport (shuttling) is strictly limited to Official training sessions & must only take place on open, public roads. A rider found using a private or team vehicle on a closed/private road or track will be subject to a penalty up to & including disqualification.

In certain circumstances, the use of public roads may be restricted for safety, medical access and/or to avoid excessive congestion on narrow roads. In such circumstances, official drop-off zones will be designated & marked on the course map and communicated in the Race Book & rider comms. Any racer found shuttling beyond these official drop-off zone's will be subject to a penalty up to & including disqualification.

In addition, any specific details or restrictions on shuttling will be outlined in the Race Book (see Chapter 0.8.1) and the Official Training schedule for each race venue.

During the race, no private/team transport can be used at any time.

0.5.7 Course Cutting

Taking shortcuts on course to gain an advantage can damage both the environment and bring the sport of enduro mountain bike racing into disrepute. Therefore, any rider trying to save time by intentionally choosing a line that lies outside of the marked, defined race course will be disqualified (DSQ).

The Chief Commissaire or Race Director may choose, in exceptional circumstances, to apply a time penalty instead of a DSQ to a rider found to have cut the course "without intention" but who subsequently gains an advantage.

0.5.8 Outside Assistance

Personal responsibility and self-sufficiency are a large part of enduro racing and riders are encouraged to carry adequate water, food & equipment for operating in mountainous environments. Each rider should remember that they are solely responsible for themselves but may assist other racers on course.

Riders should be prepared to carry sufficient water to last a minimum of 2 hours of racing between water stops. Although water may be available more frequently than this at many events, no rider should assume so and therefore must be prepared to keep themselves hydrated for a minimum of 2 hours of riding.

Racers are permitted to stop on course, outside of special stages, to access water and food at neutral shops/cafes and water supplies.

Food, equipment & clothing "stashes" left or provided, by anyone along the course are not permitted – see Chapter 0.7.1. Any evidence of this occurring will result in penalties being applied to any rider accessing a "stash".

Outside Assistance restrictions apply to Tier 1 and Tier 2 events – see Chapter 1.

0.5.9 Results

The General Classification (GC) will be calculated by adding all Special Stage times together for each rider. In the event of unforeseen or extreme circumstances, Race Control have the right, if deemed necessary, to withdraw a Special Stage(s) from the General Classification.

In the case where Special Stage(s) have had to be cancelled / withdrawn, an event must have a minimum of two complete Special Stages for the result to be deemed valid for the Global or (if applicable) World Cup ranking.

In the event of a tie in the General Classification, the highest placed rider on the final stage will be awarded the higher final placing.

A rider not finishing a Special Stage (DNF – Did Not Finish) will NOT be allowed to rejoin the race at any time.

Any rider who subsequently rejoins the race after a Special Stage DNF will be disqualified from the General Classification.

The only exception to this is as follows:

In the event of a rider being unable to complete a special stage due to assisting another rider in a medical emergency or due to some other "exceptional circumstance" outside of their control **and only** if Race Control decide it is appropriate, a rider may be offered a re-run on that special stage.

If Race Control deem that a re-run of the special stage in question is not possible then at the end of the race the racer will be allocated an "average" Special Stage position & time.

This will be calculated as follows:



Race control will take the racers actual finishing position across all special stages completed, minus their worst stage result & using this calculate their average stage finishing position.

This average special stage position will then be awarded for the incomplete stage.

For example, if a rider's average calculated stage finish position over the entire race was 3rd then they would be allocated the **same time** as the current 3rd place on the incomplete stage.

0.5.10 Podiums and Prize Money

Podium presentations will be made for the top 3 riders in each category.

All riders must attend the podium as scheduled – failure to attend on time may result in a 200 EUR fine and / or a forfeiture of any relevant titles or prize money.

Inappropriately dressed event staff (e.g. podium girls) are banned at all WBDS event award ceremonies.

All prize monies paid at WBDS events must be equal between Male and Female categories.

See Chapter 1 for Tier 1 event prize money minimums and World Cup Overall prize money.

0.5.11 Leaders Jerseys

Refer to Chapter 1 for UCI Enduro World Cup Leader Jerseys.

0.5.12 National Champions Jersey

A rider who has won a UCI recognised Enduro National Championship in their country must have their National Champion jersey approved by their National Federation prior to wearing at a UCI Enduro World Cup competition.

Sleeves and arm bands are only permitted for Official National Cycling Federation awarded Enduro National Champions and are mandatory at all UCI Enduro World Cups.

0.5.13 UCI World Champions' Jersey

World champions (1.3.060 UCI Rules and Regulations) **must** wear their jersey in all events in the discipline, speciality and category in which they won their title, and no other event, until the evening of the day before the commencement of the next edition of the world championships of said discipline, speciality and category.

0.6: Safety | return to menu

0.6.1 First Aid + Evacuation

A Medical & rescue evacuation Plan and location of the First Aid Base will be available at race headquarters and communicated in the race book.

Medical & rescue staff should hold a relevant qualification which must, as a minimum, meet the standards required in the given territory of the event. WBD will appoint qualified & experienced medic rescue consultants who will liaise with the locally appointed medic rescue staff to ensure consistency of medic rescue planning & a minimum level of equivalent competence of medic rescue staff across all races in the series.

The Event Organiser must supply each racer with the details of who to contact in the event of an accident on course.

During all races & Official Training sessions, the Event Organiser must provide at least one medical base station open during all training hours, suitably approved on course medic / rescue cover and medical contacts for riders to use in the event of a training accident.

It is best practice for the Event Organiser to include space for a rider's medical details and emergency contact information on the rear of the number plate. It is the rider's responsibility to add any personal details accurately.

At remote events that include hard to access backcountry stages, the Race Director may ask all riders to carry a whistle, to be used to attract attention in the event of an emergency. It is the rider's responsibility to supply their own whistle.

It is strongly recommended that Event Organisers phase Official Training into zones to reduce the areas needing to be covered by medical staff during Official Training times.

For example: Special Stages 1-3 open Friday Morning (09:00 - 12:00), Special Stages 4-6 Friday Afternoon (13:00 - 16:00)

Where a rider believes another competitor is injured on course, they should alert the next race official / marshal they see. The Special Stage result of any rider delayed due to voluntarily assisting another rider will be determined by the Chief Commissaire or Race Director per 0.5.9

Race Directors and / or medical staff reserve the right to remove any racer from the course if they feel it is unsafe for the racer to proceed.

Race Directors may also remove any racers from course if the racer exhibits disruptive or reckless behaviour that endangers themselves or others.

Race Director reserves the right to alter, halt or cancel the event in case of emergency, adverse weather conditions or unforeseen circumstances.

0.6.2 Concussion Protocol and Medical Records

Any racer who fails a concussion assessment by a Registered / Licensed Health Care Professional (HCP) during that event, will be removed from the current practice session or race and will be prohibited from further participation in any practice session or race until cleared in writing by a Registered / Licensed Health Care Professional (HCP) to resume such activity.

Should a concussion be confirmed by a Registered / Licensed Health Care Professional (HCP) the athlete is responsible for completing a "graduated return to activity' plan.

During all WBDS events, medical staff may collect preliminary rider injury and illness data, to monitor the magnitude of issues that occur. As part of a rider's participation this will include a rider's medical data should any rider sustain an injury (or illness) during an event.

No rider will be identifiable at any stage during any collection of this data, and any data collected on a rider will be always anonymized and kept strictly confidential. The information gathered may be used by WBDS to help guide and direct future rider health and injury/illness prevention initiatives. A rider does not need to do anything as part of this data collection

0.6.3 Safety Equipment Requirements

All riders must wear a full face helmet during competition at any time they are riding their bike. This includes during both liaison and Special Stages. If a rider dismounts & pushes their bike on a liaison, then the helmet may be removed but must be worn again as soon as they remount the bike. When being worn the helmet must always be worn correctly with straps fastened. The helmet should meet the regulations set by the National Federation. The correct fitting, condition and suitability of the rider's helmet is the sole responsibility of the rider.

A two-piece helmet (with removable chin piece) will be accepted as a full-face helmet. The chin piece may be removed for riding liaisons only but MUST be securely fitted prior to starting any special stage. This notwithstanding due to national insurance and federation regulations any helmet used in an event must pass the standards of that territory's national regulations. Further information may be found in the Race Book for each event.

Specific body protection and helmet requirements may also be stipulated at each event, in accordance with that territory's national regulations. Any protection rules put in place by the Event Organiser must be followed by all racers. No exceptions will be permitted.

For safety reasons the Event Organiser of any event can make it mandatory that ALL racers carry a water/windproof jacket or whistle. In this case, no racer will be allowed to leave the start line without the prescribed equipment. Details of any mandatory equipment will be announced in the Event Notice section of the Race Book. All riders must attend a race prepared for this eventuality.

It is strongly recommended that all racers carry:

- Suitable backpack



- Waterproof jacket
- Emergency blanket
- Tube / puncture repair kit
- Multi tool
- Basic, well maintained first aid kit
- Course Map
- Food and fluids
- Eye protection (glasses or goggles)
- Emergency contacts supplied by Event Organiser
- Whistle

0.7: Environmental Rules | return to menu

0.7.1 Waste & the Environment

Enduro mountain bike racing allows us to ride into remote, backcountry areas of natural beauty. It is of the utmost importance that all racers respect the environment and consider the impact they leave behind for the local riding community. The below rules have been put in place to protect our trails and our riding environments.

WBDS and its local organisers reserve the right to penalise any rider whose actions are deemed to seriously damage the local environment.

No disposable goggle tear-offs are allowed to be used.

Riders cannot intentionally drop anything (e.g. food wrappers, tubes, broken equipment etc) outside of a publicly available trash can. Any rider deemed to be abusing the environment will be penalised. Riders must always aim to leave nothing on course.

Riders must not store food and drinks or clothing and equipment on the trail (Food/Gear Stashes). Packaging left behind and uncontrolled food supplies may have a serious impact on local wildlife and the local environment. Any rider found to be hiding or retrieving supplies from unofficial feed / tech stations will be penalised.

Riders must not store or drop clothing or equipment on the trail (Kit Stashes) during Official Training or racing. All riders must remain self-sufficient and carry off the trails what they carry onto them.

Any racer found damaging the course or altering a Special Stage without the Event Organiser approval will be subject to a penalty including disqualification.

0.7.2 Single Use Plastics



WBDS is working towards eliminating single use plastics at all events. Local Event Organisers are urged to minimize single use plastics.

0.8: Communication | return to menu

0.8.1 Race Book

The Race Book document will be made available online and will include the following details:

- Schedule including course announcement date
- Race entry procedures and cancellation policies
- Race categories
- License requirements
- Protection rules
- Uplift / shuttling plan
- Venue map
- Course overview
- Emergency response and medical
- Event Organiser contacts
- Any other special regulations or policies

The Race Books may also contain other information regarding the venue and race logistics to help racers plan and prepare.

It is the rider's responsibility to read and understand the Race Book. Having not read the Race Book will not be accepted as an excuse for any rule violation by any rider.

Race Book documents are available on https://ucimtbworldseries.com/ for Tier 1 events and the Open Racing Tier 2 Events. Refer to the Event Organiser's website for other designated Qualifier Tier 2 events.

0.8.3 Course Maps

A course map will be produced by WBD in a digital format that allows competitors to navigate around the

A course map will also be displayed at registration and in Race Headquarters. This map may also be published on the event website. Riders must study the map and understand the race route before leaving the start. For Tier 1 (and related) events, the course map will be released a minimum of 5 days before training starts.

0.9: Rankings | return to menu

0.9.1 Enduro Global Rankings

The Enduro Global Rankings are based on the UCI Enduro World Cup and Tier 2 World Series Qualifier events. All points scored will be included in the Enduro Global Ranking.

Enduro Global Rankings are valid for a period of 12 months from the date of the event.

0.9.2 World Cup Standings

Refer to Chapter 1 for details regarding the UCI Enduro World Cup Overall Standings, titles and prize money.

0.9.3 Team Rankings

Only UCI Mountain Bike World Series Teams & UCI mountain bike teams will contest the team rankings of the UCI Enduro World Cup.

See Chapter 1 for details.

0.10: Anti Doping Policy | return to menu

0.10.1 Anti-Doping Policy

All riders entered into the event must comply with all Anti-Doping regulations and procedures if asked to do so. Failure to do so will result in disqualification from that event and further penalisation as deemed appropriate by WBDS.

WBDS will respect and assist any National Cycling Federation / Anti-Doping Agency operating anti-doping controls at Enduro events.

WBDS will respect all penalties imposed by any Anti-Doping agency on any rider in the Enduro.

Any rider serving a ban imposed by any Anti-Doping Agency, in any individual nation, will not be able to compete in any WBDS event (Tier 1 or 2) for the duration of that ban.

Any WBDS event (Tier 1 or 2) results achieved during the period of an anti-doping rule violation, including any retrospective bans or penalties, shall be disqualified.

WBDS reserves the right to maintain a zero-tolerance approach to drug taking in Enduro.

WBDS will follow all ITA rules, protocols and procedures. It is the responsibility of all riders, teams, coaches to read and follow all advice and documents provided by ITA.

For the full UCI Anti-Doping rules see UCI Rules Chapter XIV.

0.11: Rule Violations | return to menu

0.11.1 Commissaires

At all Tier 1 events, the appointed Chief UCI Commissaire will have the final say in rule violations and penalties.

At other UCI Mountain Bike World Series affiliated events where a commissaire has been appointed, the Commissaire will have the final say. If no Commissaire has been appointed, the Race Director is responsible for the application of the rules and has the final say.

0.11.2 Rule Violation Recording

All rule violations must be filed, including the recording of witnesses, with race control, Chief Commissaire or Race Director.

The Race Director may appoint special 'Flying Marshals' to travel around the course at their own discretion to undisclosed points. These 'Flying Marshals' can report rule violations to the Commissaire or Race Director.

WBDS officials, race officials & staff eg stage managers / marshals may also report rule violations to the Commissaire or Race Director.

All rule decision appeals must be submitted to Race control (Chief commissaire & or race director, WBD or LOC) **BEFORE** the podium presentation ceremony begins. There is no appeal process for rule decisions following the commencement of the podium presentation ceremony. All results will stand following this time.

0.11.3 Penalties

The Commissaire and Race Director are authorised to give additional penalties (including verbal warnings, fines, relegation of position, time, or points penalty and/or disqualification) that are not listed in the Rules in the case of a rider who fails to respect the other riders, the spirit of the sport, the environment, or the organisation.

0.12: Athlete Ethos | return to menu

WBDS aims to run a series that pushes the level of athleticism, and sporting endeavour, while also firmly promoting the correct ethos for all. Riders considered to have not met the standards expected by WBDS may face disqualification or ban.

Therefore, if at any time, in the opinion of WBDS, a rider becomes the subject of public disrepute, contempt, or scandal that affects WBDS's image, reputation or goodwill, then WBDS may, upon written notice to rider, immediately suspend or terminate the rider's entry to any or all WBDS events.

We simply ask all riders to;

- Respect the trail
- Respect each other
- Respect the environment
- Respect the local community
- Respect the organisers, staff and volunteers
- Respect the rules and fair sport

1.1 General | return to menu

1.1.1 Training

A maximum of one training run is allowed per Special Stage at Tier 1 events. (this includes any repeated stages)

Refer to Chapter 0.5.5 for Core Rules - Training.

1.1.2 Outside Assistance & Technical Assistance Zone (TAZ)

Only in the Technical Assistance Zone (TAZ) are racers allowed to change any part of their clothing or equipment (not stickered bike parts) with assistance from non-racers.

The TAZ will have a designated catchment area (approx. 1km²) which will be clearly marked on the race maps. Riders may access TAZ any time the official course route passes through this catchment area & during any officially allocated TAZ time break.

Racers are allowed to collect and drop equipment or food in the TAZ.

Racers are only allowed to give any waste equipment to another person (this includes event or team staff and fans) in the TAZ.

No food is allowed to be prepared or given to a racer by a member of the racer's support crew unless the rider is in an officially marked TAZ.

Racers can gain verbal assistance from anyone during a race but no one other than another racer can physically help a racer, touch their equipment, or provide any supplies outside of the TAZ.

Pacing: Team staff are not allowed to set a pace for their team riders along liaisons by riding with them or in front of them. Pacing is defined as when a rider is assisted with their speed on a liaison through either ongoing and regular verbal or aerodynamic assistance by a non-racer.

Refer to Chapter 0.5.8 for Core Rules - Outside Assistance.

1.1.3 GPS/Tracking, Onboard Cameras, Timing and Live Streaming

Only Official UCI Teams and partners will be allowed to film on race day at Tier 1 events (subject to the terms of the WBDS Broadcast Rights Agreement).

Only riders from Official UCI Teams and partners will be permitted to wear onboard cameras during race days at Tier 1 events. All rights will be retained by WBDS.

Any onboard camera or live streaming of competition by riders or teams must be pre-approved by WBDS before broadcast.

All broadcast rights for Tier 1 events remain the right of WBDS.

WBDS may request that a racer carry an official GPS/tracking device or Point of View (POV) camera supplied by WBDS during competition. The GPS/Tracking units and POV cameras will be distributed to the select riders before the start. All data will remain the right of WBDS.

Riders will be charged for any timing chips, GPS units or POV cameras not returned at the finish line. A minimum fine of 100 EUR dependent on equipment will be issued.

Onboard POV cameras may be used during official training. Cameras worn on the rider must only be attached to the helmet & only using a purpose designed detachable mount or attached to a detachable helmet visor. Chest mounts are not allowed.

WBDS / UCI camera waiver

Any racer wearing an onboard camera during Official Training or races at a Tier 1/2 Enduro event is deemed to have read and agreed to the Union Cycliste Internationale (UCI) <u>Technical Regulations</u> document, article 1.3.006 BIS.

Racer is fully aware and conscious of the potential risks that might arise with the use of such equipment and accepts them. To the extent permitted by the applicable law, racer releases UCI, their National Federation, the organisers, the host broadcaster, the sponsors, and their respective members, directors, officers, employees, volunteers, contractors and agents from any liability linked to the utilisation of the camera on the bicycle and/or onto the visors/peaks of the helmet. This concerns in particular cases of accidents, injury, and damage to personal property or third-party property linked to the utilisation of a camera on the bicycle and/or onto the visors/peaks of the helmet during training sessions / qualifications / finals of the UCI Enduro World Cup on the UCI International Mountain bike events calendar.

Racer acknowledges and agrees that they will not receive any cash payment or other financial compensation for the rights and permissions granted by them under this agreement.

In addition racers acknowledge and adhere to the 2025 UCI MTBWS Terms and Conditions document.

1.1.4 Liaison Stage Delay / Missed Start

Racers in Tier 1 events will have preassigned start times for all Special Stages.

Racers must present themselves at the start line in time for their preassigned stage start time.

All special stages will be equipped with a Special stage "Check in" point close to but before the official start line which racers must pass. This check in point will record a "check in time" for the racer. The check in time may be used by race control to provide addition evidence of a racers arrival time at a special stage start in case of any delay or dispute around stage start time.

All late riders must start only under instructions from the official stage starter (usually a commissaire but may be an appointed Start Marshal) who will determine a suitable gap in the start order. No fixed start interval will be applied between late starters as the goal is to keep late riders racing, without affecting other riders on course.

In cases where the late racer is delayed further due to insufficient gaps in the start order, penalties will be calculated based on a racer's Stage Check-in time. If a rider fails to check-in, the penalty will be based on their Stage start time.

Late starters will receive a fixed penalty: Up to 5 minutes late = 1 minute penalty 5+ minutes late = 5 minute penalty 30+ minutes late = DNF

Any racer arriving at the start of a Special Stage later than 30 minutes after their specified start time will be assigned a DNF for the race and will not be allowed to start that or any other subsequent stages.

Start Penalties

A rider is allowed to start with both feet on the pedals.

Any rider starting before the Starter's orders may be subject to a penalty. Other Start Violations (example: pushing into queue, delaying start, jumping start etc) may also be subject to penalty.

Delays

Any delay applied to Special Stage start times must be maintained throughout that day of racing. <u>Commissaires</u> <u>must not attempt to catch up on delays while racing is underway.</u>

Example. If there is a 10 minute course hold on Special Stage 1, 10 minutes must be added to the start times of all remaining Special Stages, for all riders effected by the hold, for the remainder of the race.



1.1.5 Team plates

Team plates will be assigned per event and will be location specific. Team plates will be provided to Official Enduro Teams to allow team staff on course and assist riders during practice only.

Team staff are not permitted to ride stages outside their riders' specific practice window.

- UCI Mountain Bike world Series Teams 3 plates
- UCI Mountain Bike Teams 2 plates

Any team found to be riding stages outside of their team's specific practice window or attempting to use a non-official team plate will have their team privileges revoked.

1.2 Enduro | return to menu

1.2.1 Race Format and Course

- Individual start on all Special Stages
- Minimum of 4 Special Stages per event
- Maximum total of 8 Special Stages in a one day race & 9 in a two day race.
- Maximum of 2400m elevation climbed (pedalled) in a one day race, 3600m in a two day race (+10% in agreed circumstances).
- Minimum of 3 different tracks must be used per event
- Individual start times for each Special Stage will be provided by WBDS timing company
- An identical Special Stage cannot be raced more than two times during one race except in exceptional circumstances (example: extreme weather)

1.2.2 Race Categories

Women Elite Women Junior (2007-2008) Men Elite Men Junior (2007-2008)

Riders who had met the qualification criteria for the U21 category as of the end of the 2024 season and have a YOB of 2005 - 2006 will be moved to the Elite category and be eligible for the 2025 Pre-Qualified Entries process, see section 1.2.3.

Riders in the Women Elite (top 15 current World Cup standings & riders with career numbers) and Men Elite (top 30 current World Cup standings and riders with career numbers) will be collectively referred to as Group A. All other racers will collectively be referred to as Group B.

1.2.3 Event Entry and Qualification

UCI license IDs are mandatory for eligibility and event entry.

In order to qualify to race in the UCI Enduro World Cup, riders must either be on an official UCI Mountain Bike Team, be selected by their National federation, be the current Enduro World champion, be the current official Enduro Continental champion, be the current official Enduro National Champion of their country, have the minimum required number of Enduro Global Ranking points or qualify through results for an upgrade during the season.

2025 UCI TEAM ENTRIES

Up to 10 riders from a UCI Mountain Bike World Series Gravity Team & UCI Mountain Bike Team are guaranteed entry at each UCI Enduro World Cup event.

Riders from UCI Mountain Bike teams registered to another format looking to race in an UCI Enduro World Cup event will be determined on a case-by-case basis and will be at the discretion of WBD Sports.

2025 NATIONAL FEDERATION ENTRIES

Riders who are not part of a UCI Mountain Bike World Series Gravity Team, or a UCI Mountain Bike Team may apply for selection as part of their National Federations Quota. There is no mandatory minimum qualification criteria to apply to a federation for selection other than age.

Selection & any selection criteria applied is at the discretion of each Federation.

Each Federation are allocated a quota of guaranteed entries at each UCI Enduro World Cup event.

Quota:

Men – 5 Women - 5 Junior Men – 7 Junior Women – 7

2025 PRE-QUALIFIED ENTRIES

Riders who are not part of a UCI Mountain Bike World Series Gravity Team, or a UCI Mountain Bike Team & are not included in a National federation quota must meet the following criteria.

Eligibility to enter the UCI Enduro World Cup is based on the following minimum 2024 Enduro Global Ranking points

- Men Elite: 125 points

- Men Elite (2005-2006): 75 points*

- Women Elite: 125 points

- Women Elite (2005-2006): 50 points*

Men Junior: 75 pointsWomen Junior: 50 points

* Riders with birth year 2005 & 2006 who due to the category reform from U21 to Junior are now classed in Men & Women elite categories will retain their pre-qualified status for Elite categories if they have sufficient 2024 Global ranking points to have met the minimum required for pre-qualification to the former U21 category (75 points for Men and 50 for Women)



Riders who meet the minimum points requirements must apply for entry through their National Federation. All eligible riders will be notified with the date that entries will open. Entries must be made by the published closing date. No late entries are permitted.

2025 QUALIFICATION

Enduro Global Ranking points and World Cup qualification upgrade possibilities will be available at World Series Qualifier (WSQ) events, which include all Open Races and all UCI Enduro national championships.

Refer to Chapter 2 (Open Races) and Chapter 3 (WSQ events) for details

WILDCARDS

There will be no Wildcard Entry system for 2025. Riders who have not pre-qualified, are not on a UCI Team, or do not want to qualify through the suggested 2025 qualification route should apply to their National Federation for a place in their allocated quota.

1.2.4 Seeding and Start Order

Seeding

Riders will be seeded based on a combination of their current 2025 UCI Enduro World Cup and Enduro Global ranking, their final 2024 UCI Enduro World Cup Ranking, UCI team status (if applicable), and any other relevant race results. Riders will be seeded in reverse order.

For the first round, start order will be based on 2024 World Cup Standing and then by Global Ranking.

Men Junior Women Junior Women Elite (outside Group A) Men Elite (outside Group A)

Women Elite (top 15 UCI Enduro World Cup rank and any rider with a career number) - Group A Men Elite (top 30 current UCI Enduro World Cup rank and any rider with a career number) - Group A

Any Rider who has won an Elite UCI Enduro World Cup will be asked to select a unique "career number" 2-999 which will be used in place of the season number board.

If due to injury a rider took part in less than three rounds of the UCI Enduro World Cup in a season, the rider or the team may apply for recognition of injury status. Approved injury status riders can be added to the start list in the appropriate order.

Very select international riders not previously ranked in the UCI Enduro World Cup and chosen by WBDS Sports may also be seeded following the official UCI Team riders.

Riders moving from U21 to the Men/Women Elite categories may be manually seeded by WBDS for the first round of the current year.

Reseeding - Final stage / TAZ

Group A racers will be reseeded for the final stage based on the General Classification. The start order will be fastest last

Any Group B racers ranked in the Top 30 (Men) and Top 15 (Women) of the General Classification will be reseeded to Group A after TAZ if applicable. A mandatory time check may be conducted at TAZ to ensure riders are reseeded accordingly; riders will be informed prior to roll out if applicable.

Start Intervals

Riders in the UCI Enduro World Cup will have individual preassigned start times for all the stages.

Start intervals between riders must be a minimum of 30 seconds.

A minimum five-minute interval between the Group A Men and the Group A Women categories must be allocated to allow accredited media to move on track.

1.2.5 Ranking Points

Both UCI Enduro World Cup and Enduro Global Ranking Points will be awarded for UCI Enduro World Cup races. Rankings points are valid for a period of 12 months from date achieved.

Full points table available in Appendix 1.

In 2026 ranking points will be classed under a new UCI Ranking points system. More information will be released later in the year.

1.2.7 Official Teams and Team Ranking

The deadline to apply to be an Official UCI MTB team is 15 January. Applications are processed by the UCI. Further information can be found in the <u>UCI Regulations</u>.

Only Official UCI Teams will contest the UCI Enduro World Cup team ranking. Riders racing in the event from an official UCI team of a different format will only be eligible for individual points, not Team points.

The UCI Enduro World Cup Team Ranking will be calculated using the three rider's highest points scoring results at each Enduro round.

Example: Team A wins the Enduro Men Elite, Enduro Women Elite and Men Junior category. That team will be awarded a total of 1000 Enduro Team ranking points for that round.

The Overall World Cup Team ranking will be calculated by adding together all UCI Enduro World Cup rounds.

In the event of multiple teams finishing the World Cup on equal points, the team with the highest amount of UCI Enduro World Cup points won in the final round will be placed higher in the final team ranking.

1.2.9 World Cup Titles

The UCI World Cup Overall title will be awarded to the athlete with the highest number of UCI World Cup ranking points after the final round.

- All UCI Enduro World Cup rounds will count towards the overall points total for the Elite categories.
- The Junior Overall title will be decided using each rider's best six UCI Enduro World Cup results.

In the event of a tie in points, the rider with the highest placing in the most recent event will be awarded the overall Leader Jersey. If a tie in points occurs at the final round of the World Cup, the rider with the highest placing in the last event will be awarded the World Cup Overall title for that year.

The overall category winners will be titled the UCI Enduro World Cup Champion.

A specially designed trophy will be awarded to the winner at the final round of the World Cup.

1.2.10 World Cup Leader Jerseys

Leader jerseys will be awarded to the overall leaders in Enduro Categories.

The leader's jersey is compulsory for the rider leading a UCI World Cup standing.

The colours and the design of the leaders' jerseys shall be communicated to the riders once approved by the UCI.

2.1: World Series Qualifiers | return to menu

All Open Races and all UCI sanctioned Enduro national championship races are automatically designated as World Series Qualifier races. WBD Sports may choose to designate other Enduro events as World Series Qualifiers at their own discretion, any events added will be published on the UCI Mountain Bike World Series website.

Riders in Enduro Open Races with a valid / active UCI license ID at the time of the race will be eligible to collect Enduro Global Ranking points as well as direct upgrade opportunities to the UCI Enduro World Cup. Refer to 2.1.11 for details.

2.1.6 E-Enduro Equipment Requirements

Bicycles (including drive systems and electronics) will be inspected by race officials prior to round one of the E-UCI Enduro World Cup. Further inspections may be carried out during or after every event. Refusal to allow this process will result in immediate disqualification.

Drive systems must conform to the EU standard EN15194 for Electrically Power Assisted Cycles (EPAC). The electrical motor assistance shall stop when the EPAC reaches a speed of 25km/h.

EPAC bikes shall have a motor which is only activated by pedalling. Walk function allowed but only in factory settings

Riders are limited to one battery. Batteries must conform with UN3480.

To monitor motor output and ensure integrity of the regulations, WBDS may fit bikes with a data acquisition box and/or a GPS tracker.

A 10% tolerance will be given for maximum speed. It is the racer's responsibility to ensure that their equipment is within these parameters and conform to the EU standard EN15194.

Additional requirements may be put in place at the discretion of WBD Sports.

2.1.7 UCI Enduro National Championships (and any other designated Enduro Qualifier events)

2.1.8: Race Format and Course

- Unless specifically exempted, all Core Rues (Chapter 0) apply
- On bike training must be scheduled by the Event Organisers at Qualifier events on all Special Stages before timed competition begins
- A minimum of 3 Special Stages must be completed for inclusion in the Global Rankings

2.1.9: Race Categories

Race categories are established by the local event organiser of the National Championships.

2.1.10: Event Entry

Entry to each Qualifier event is the responsibility of each Event Organiser. Links to all events are available at https://ucimtbworldseries.com/

No prequalification requirements, however, license requirements for Qualifier events are established by the National Federation in the host country and vary depending on the event. It is the responsibility of the racer to check and comply with license requirements. Check the Race Book or the Event Organiser's website for more details.

2.1.11: Results and Ranking Points

Enduro Global Ranking Points as well as direct upgrade opportunities to the UCI Enduro World Cup will be available at all Enduro Open Races and all UCI sanctioned Enduro national championship races.

Only riders with a UCI Mountain Bike World Series account and a valid / active UCI license ID at the time of a race will be eligible to collect Enduro Global Ranking Points as well as direct upgrade opportunities. Only riders holding a UCI license ID with the National designation of the host nation will be eligible to collect Points and receive an upgrade to the World Cup at UCI national championship races.

The following categories will be used to calculate Points and upgrades. Providing all riders/local categories are racing the same course and number of stages, all riders (including Master and Junior) will be sorted into one of the following World Cup categories based on their gender and year of birth: Men, Women, Men Junior, and Women Junior.

Points and upgrades are awarded to riders with a UCI license ID based on a rider's actual finish position in their applicable ranking category - regardless of how many riders with a UCI license ID placed ahead of them.

In order to be eligible to collect Points or be awarded an upgrade, a racer must finish within 20% of the winning time in their applicable ranking category.

Enduro Global Ranking points will be awarded based on the applicable Tier 2 Points Scales. Refer to Appendix 2.

Direct Upgrade Opportunities

Providing they are a UCI license ID holder at the time of the race, the following riders will automatically qualify for all remaining UCI Enduro World Cup rounds in the current season.

Providing the minimum rider numbers are met in the race event and the riders meet the above specified requirements the following riders will automatically qualify for entry into **one** UCI Enduro World Cup round of their choice in the current season, depending on event location restrictions and current capacity of chosen event.

POINT SCALE | World Series Qualifiers

Applicable Group will be established based on the host nation of the race event. This has been determined based on the nation's overall Global Ranking Points from the 2024 season.

If a rider finishes with a time outside 20% of that of the relevant category, they are not eligible for points.

Open Racing

Only riders holding a UCI license ID and entered in one of the below categories will be eligible to collect points and receive and upgrade to the World Cup.

For the Open E-Enduro, no points are available. Riders looking to qualify for the UCI Enduro World Cup should follow the Qualification Criteria section 1.2.

National Championships

Only riders holding a UCI license ID with the National designation of the host nation will be eligible to collect Points and receive an upgrade to the World Cup at UCI national championship races.

Points are rounded to the nearest value; no fractions are used.
